# CALL FOR NOMINATIONS: BUTCHER MEDAL FOR EXCELLENCE IN INTERNATIONAL HUMAN RIGHTS LAW

218

The American Society of International Law invites nominations for its Butcher Medal, which the Society may award to an individual human rights lawyer, scholar or other person working in the area of international human rights law. The Medal honors the late Goler T. Butcher, a prominent member of the Society who achieved eminence in this field.

Nominees should have achieved excellence in international human rights law, defined as the expansion of human rights values and human rights law, including contributions to the promotion, protection and application of international human rights, especially their legal outcomes. Preference will be given to candidates whose career or sustained involvement in international human rights law demonstrates public or professional prominence in the field. In exceptional cases, the Medal may be awarded for intense, excellent and notable work involving international human rights law during a period of at least two years.

Supporting material should include statements and/or letters in support of the nomination; curriculum vitae of candidates; names, addresses and telephone and/or fax numbers of any additional supporting references; and other relevant material or information. Nominations for the 1997 award must be received by the Committee no later than February 15, 1997.
