

Judicial "Alianza"

CONTENTS

THE Organization of American States, this month observing its 75th anniversary, has recently been added the Alliance for Progress, the two providing mechanisms for hemispheric cooperation in the political and economic fields, respectively. Now there are proposals for establishment of a Latin American common market, after the pattern of the highly successful European common market.

Political and economic stability and progress are dependent upon sound and stable domestic governments, and these, in turn, require honest and efficient administration of the judicial branch of the government. There is every reason to believe that a forum for mutual exchange of ideas and discussion of common problems of judicial administration would be as useful and constructive a contribution to hemispheric progress and solidarity as the O.A.S., the "Alianza para el Progreso" or a common market.

That is why the Judicial Conference of the Americas, composed of national chief justices or their representatives, scheduled to meet in San Juan, Puerto Rico, on May 26, may be considered an outstanding event in the mid-century history of these continents. We congratulate the Supreme Court of Puerto Rico and the Puerto Rican government on their vision and statesmanship in calling and sponsoring this gathering, and we extend good wishes to the distinguished jurists who will assemble there.
